The "Relationships Resource" mentioned in Lesson #9 could not be found. Lesson #15 (Youth Health Rights) does not discuss age limit for testing. Lesson #19 says that "youth, 12 and older" can get condoms confidentially at many clinics but this is not the correct age requirement. Great videos on local clinics that map out what services are available locally and are a good model for other LEAs. Lesson #15: A questions in Jeopardy Questions and Answers activity is incorrect needs to be fixed ("30 – Who consents to a pregnancy test for an 11-year-old teen? Parent/guardian") Pregnancy-related services are available to an individual of any age; there is no lower age limit. This also needs to be made clearer in slide #26 of the same lesson. |

Lesson #16 states that the Pill is 92-99.7% effective, however typical use is 91% effective, which should be stated. Slide 16 from Lesson #16 contains the sentence, "While pre-cum doesn't contain sperm" This is contradictory to statements elsewhere in the curriculum (Lesson #16 slide 13, Lesson #12 slide 30) which state that there may be sperm in pre-cum. The reviewers recommend removing the definitive statement about sperm not being in pre-cum. The discussion of sterilization options does not need to include the commercial method's name, (i.e., Essure). This may be problematic for methods that leave the market and may quickly make a curriculum outdated. Reviewers recommend keeping this information generic. |

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS:

Each lesson is clearly written and provides clear teacher/facilitator guidance on how to implement the curriculum. Clear objectives, agenda, and suggestions for materials needed are provided.

Suggestions/missing components:

Some discussion topics/messages go beyond the required scope of the CA Healthy Youth Act (e.g. extended discussion on various types of relationships) and this may be challenging to for some communities and for some teachers. The reviewers note that "Be Real. Be Ready" is a progressive program and may require additional preparation for teachers and parents, or local modification to meet the needs of communities.

To meet the requirements of CHYA, Lesson #4 (Sexuality: Sex, Gender and Orientation) needs to be included.

Most of Lesson #1 does not work for districts outside of SFUSD, but provides a good template for districts to replicate within their own community.

Lesson #17 does not work for schools outside of San Francisco as it involves a presentation from a local agency.

- Relationship Issues and Values handout for Lesson #11
- Relationship Resources handout in Lesson #9
- Lesson #15 slide 18 "Common Questions to Ask a Counselor" "If I tell you I do drugs, will you call the police?" The notes should help a teacher explain what would happen if a student brings up this issue. This isn't addressed until slide 21.
