There are missed opportunities in the section on male and female reproductive systems to address transgender

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				people. There is a brief mention but it should be more indepth. There is another missed opportunity to be explicit about transgender people in the gender stereotypes section.

There is no discussion on what causes STIs or the distinction between bacterial and viral infections. There is no information on the distinction between cure versus treatment.

There is no mention of reducing one's number of sexual partners.

Discussion of risk reduction of sexual activities is minimal (only to use a condom), Further, there is no mention of reducing the number of one's sexual partners. Curriculum needs to include information on IV drug use and prevention.

While this is Washington state based curriculum and it does not provide California-specific resources, it does provide some national resources (which include ways to find local resources) and encourages teachers to create their own resource sheets containing all the required resources. Homework for Lesson 7 requires students to find local sexual assault/intimate partner violence resources.

Information about IUDs is not current and needs to be updated. Withdrawal is presented as a birth control method. While not FDA-approved, this may be an important topic to cover to address student concerns and questions. However, the reviewers felt the framing of this topic was insufficient to address the disadvantages and difficulties of the withdrawal method. Recent research suggests that preejaculate contains sperm, which makes this method fairly

ADDITIONAL COMMENTS

In Lesson 3 – Pregnancy, assessment question #4 - INCORRECT ANSWER - Answer should be Both **B** & C, not A & C as the answer key states. Answer A could result in a crisis pregnancy center that does not provide medically accurate information or the full range of options for pregnancy.

This curriculum provides many resources for families and there is an option for students to do individual instead of family homework. The reviewers felt that the options for family/parent involvement were a strength of the FLASH curriculum.
